

ARN, FRED	Lamar Democrat, August 4, 1887 Mrs. E. E. Tomlinson received a telegram from New Philadelphia, Ohio, from J. N. Arn announcing the death of Fred Arn on Thursday evening. Fred was well known in Lamar.
BAKER, A. C. MRS	Lamar Democrat, July 21, 1887 Mr. Barnery received a telegram last Friday announcing the sudden death of his sister, Mrs. A. C. Baker, wife of Dr. Baker, of Pike county, Illinois.
BAKER, MINDA	Lamar Democrat, July 21, 1887 Died at Sheldon on Wednesday, the 13 th of July, Minda Baker, daughter of Zach Baker, aged 23 years. Miss Minda had been suffering from typhoid fever and on the 4 th of July exerted herself and caused a relapse that caused her death.
BARHAM, J. L. MRS.	Lamar Democrat, March 31, 1887 From Mrs. Cook of Barton City, we learn that Mrs. J. L. Barham of that township died on Tuesday night. She leaves a husband and quite a family of children.
BARNES, WILLIAM	Lamar Democrat, August 4, 1887 From the Hannibal Journal of July 29 th , we learn that a man giving his name as William Barnes, and hailing from Lamar, was struck by a freight train and killed.
BASS, DAVID	Lamar Democrat, July 28, 1887 David Bass of Milford township died on Monday. His friends stated at the time of death, he was 94 years of age. He has raised 3 sets of children. His 4 th wife survives him. Without doubt he was the oldest man in Barton county.
BATH, WILLIAM	Lamar Democrat, July 7, 1887 Nashville---During the Nashville celebration a storm cloud came up and a streak of lightning hit a big tree and passing down killed Wm. Bath and Jackson Watson.
BEAL, J. F.	Lamar Democrat, June 23, 1887 From the Liberal Ensign Died at the residence of John Perkins on the 16 th of June, J. F. Beal, aged 34 years.
BEAM, ALPHA LOLA	Lamar Democrat, December 13, 1887 Died December 8 th , 1887, Alpha Lola Beam aged 3 years, 6 months and 15 days. Little Alpha was not only the pet of the whole family, in fact the neighborhood where she lived.
BEEBE, THOMAS	Lamar Democrat, January 20, 1887 We had not stopped talking about the suicide of Mr. Jeffries of Milford township, when the news came that Thomas Beebe had committed suicide. On Tuesday afternoon he went into the barn and having secured a rope he fastened one end to the rafters and the other about his neck and swung off. He apparently had considered the

	matter calmly written a letter, the contents we failed to learn, but apparently he preferred death to poverty. His brothers found the body when they started to search for cattle.

BROCK, JOHN E.	Lamar Democrat, February 17, 1887 John E. Brock is dead. He died on Sunday morning at 10 minutes past 7 o'clock. He fell asleep in his office on the square Friday night and became so chilled that when found on Saturday morning he was speechless. Dr. Drake was called and got his blood circulating. It was thought during Saturday night that he would recover. He was 48 years old and a native of McCoupin county Illinois. He came to Lamar, about 13 years ago. He leaves two children, a son and a daughter. He had no relatives here.
BURNSIDES, CLYDE	Lamar Democrat, August 18, 1887 Irwin items---Mr. and Mrs. Burnsidess lost their youngest child, Clyde at Odessa last week. They came home immediately and now their 2 nd son, 4 years old is dangerously ill.
BUTLER, F. M.	Lamar Democrat, February 17, 1887 F. M. Butler of Iantha, living near Iantha, was in town on Saturday. He lately lost his son and his wife and has for weeks been confined to bed unable to move without assistance.
CAMMICK, MR.	Lamar Democrat, June 2, 1887 Imo items—located in Doylesport township Mr. Cammick, the old gentleman is dead, he was buried in Warwick cemetery on Tuesday.
CAMPBELL, INFANT	Lamar Democrat, December 22, 1887 An infant child of R. M. Campbell living a few miles northeast of Lamar died on Monday last.
CAMPBELL, R. G.	Lamar Democrat, November 10, 1887 R. G. Campbell dead on last Saturday. R. G. Campbell, familiarity known as Bob finished the battle of life and passed into the unknown future. He had been editing and publishing the Sheldon Enterprise for the last six years.
CANNON, GLENN CONE	Lamar Democrat, June 2, 1887 Died at the residence of her parents in this city on Tuesday evening, May 31 st , Glenn

	<p>Cone Cannon, aged 30 years and 23 days. She was buried on Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock. She was called to Kansas to look after her real estate interest there and having concluded her business was struck with brain trouble and she who went away a few days before well, hearty and independent, earning a support for herself and her little boy, was brought back raving mad, bereft of reason. This lasted only a few days and she passed to a brighter world. She was ever cheerful and kind, learned to set type and worked faithfully in various offices of the city. Her married life was unhappy, through no fault of hers, but this is not the place to speak of it.</p>
CLARK, JOHN	<p>Lamar Democrat, January 13, 1887 At the Cherryvale schoolhouse in Cedar county at a protracted meeting Lem Oakes disturbed the congregation. Upon request of the minister, John Clark put Oakes out of the house. As young Clark and his father were coming out of the meeting, Oakes pulled a knife and nearly cut Clark's head from his body. The young man expired immediately, dying in his father's arms. Threats of lynching are freely indulged in.</p>
COX, FRANK MRS.	<p>Lamar Democrat, April 7, 1887 Died on Saturday night about 12 o'clock, Mrs. Frank Cox, wife of Frank Cox has been sick for some time, but her death was sudden and unexpected. She died at her father's house in her husband's arms. She leaves 2 small children, both girls.</p>
COX, INFANT	<p>Lamar Democrat, August 11, 1887 Mr. Cox's little girl died last Friday. It's mother had preceded it but a few months before and now there is missing from the family chain another link which will tend to draw those near who are left behind. (I believe this might be Frank Cox's daughter-his wife died week of April 7, 1887---Bruce)</p>
CUSTARD, W. D.	<p>Lamar Democrat, June 9, 1887 From the Independence Sentinel During a storm yesterday evening, David Custer, a workman in the employ of Brigham and Hunt, contractors, who were engaged in grading Pickwick Place, was struck and instantly killed by lightning. Custer is 22 years of age and is supposed to have lived at Lamar. The contractors had the body left at Ott's undertaking establishment with orders for its' burial at their expense.</p> <p>W. D. Custard, son of J. T. Custard left his home near Lamar on the first of March and went to Independence to work, and while engaged in grading the streets to a new addition to the city on last Friday was struck by lightning and instantly killed. His remains were shipped to Lamar, on Sunday and buried in the old Steelman graveyard about five miles south of Lamar. Mr. Custard, his father, in speaking of the death of his son said the contractors, Messrs. Brigham and Hunt and his comrades had done everything and all that could be done for his son. A burial outfit complete, clothing, coffin and all else had been secured and paid for and the passage for the dead boy to Lamar was paid for</p>

She passed from earth to heaven to join her Savior and her two babes that preceded her to glory. She leaves behind to mourn her, two interesting daughters who sadly miss her and a grief stricken husband with whom she had 35 years. She was a charter member of the Presbyterian Church in Lamar. She was buried in the city cemetery.

Jackson, aged 9 years, 8 months and 14 days. Just 1 week prior to her death, Mr. and Mrs. Jackson lost their daughter, Ollie, aged 7 years and now the death of little Mary. (Doctors Dunn and Dye said death was due to diphtheria)
JACKSON, OLLIE K.	Lamar Democrat, October 13, 1887 Died on Tuesday morning, October 11 th , 1887 at 11 o'clock, Ollie K. Jackson, daughter of John and Alpha M. Jackson, age 7 years, 4 months and 5 days. She was buried on Wednesday. The funeral took place from the house.
JEFFRIES, GEORGE W.	Lamar Democrat, January 20, 1887 The report that Geo. W. Jeffries, living 12 miles northeast of Lamar had hung

It is stated that Mr. Jeffries arose on Tuesday morning at the usual hour and went out to feed his stock, telling his wife to call him when breakfast was ready. When she called she got no reply and went out to the barn to see after him. She found him hanging by a bridle in the corncrib. He was financially embarrassed, but had property to pay himself out many times over, thus no reason for this act. He was noted for his honesty and was one of the oldest settlers of the county having come here over 30 years ago. He was married in this county and his children all grown and settled in life.</p>

WEBB, T. E.	Lamar Democrat, December 13, 1887 T. E. Webb conductor on the C B & Q railroad, brother-in-law of F. W. Stockton of Lamar died last Wednesday. Mr. Webb married Mr. Stockton's sister. Mr. Webb was like a father to him, having looked after him since his boyhood.
WILSON, E. L.	Lamar Democrat, July 28, 1887 Died at his home, one half mile north of Lamar, E. L. Wilson, aged 75 years. He was buried on Monday morning.
WINTER, EARNEST	Lamar Democrat, September 15, 1887 On last Sunday morning, a young man named Earnest Winters was found dead on the railroad tracks near Minden. (Long Article, gave further description and coroner's inquest)
WOLLEY, INFANT	Lamar Democrat, July 28, 1887 Verdella versions---Died, infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Wolley on Wednesday, July 20 th and was interred Thursday in the Sheldon Cemetery. DUDE
