Mrs. Hannah Rix, eighty six, or sixty five years a resident f the Iantha community, died t a hospital in Long Beach at :10 p.m., Tuesday. Although ong in frail health, as a result of the infirmities of ge, the eighty six year old woman, noted for her independence, left for California to visit a daughter in August. She made the trip by jet plane, on one of the gr first jet flights out of Kansas City to the west coast. The immediate cause of her death was not learned but she had suffered from the various complications that accompany the deterioration of the circulatory system for several years.

pl Hannah Grace Rix was born gig March 10, 1873 at Abilene, WI-Kansas, the daughter of Wilpel. liam and Lucy Jones. She was a married at Abilene to William w:1 Rix on May 19, 1892. Two years in later the couple came to Barto ton county to settle north of Iantha on a farm. Later the hus- ec band went into the automobile business in the early days of the industry. He operated a gaand at one time was agent for Ford cars, when agencies in small hamlets were g common. On embarking in the business, the family moved into the village of Iantha where the deceased virtually lived out her life.

THE HUSBUILD OF 1943. Following his death the widow remained in the home at Iantha, firmly refusing any suggestions that she might make her home with or nearer her children. She remained there, interested in the affairs of the church and the community in general until last spring when her health became such that it was necessary for her to dispose of her home. She consented to come to the home of her daughter, Mrs. Lucy Veale, in Lamar, where she remained until she made the trip to California.

She leaves three sons, Clarence Rix, well known Lamar business man, Walter Rix of Houston, Texas, Lester Rix of Kansas City, Kansas and two daughters, Mrs. Lucy Veale of Lamar and Mrs. Beulah Stout of Long Beach, California. One daugher, Mrs. Sadie Percy, died in young womanhood leaving a small daughter now Mrs. Elaine Maxwell of Long Beach, California, who was reared by her maternal grandparents. One son, John William Rix, the twin of Mrs. Lucy Veale, died in early childhood.

The remains are to be shipped to Lamar via air express to be received at the Konantz Funeral Home. The arrangements for the last rites await word on the time of arrival of the body in Kansas City. However the long time and highly esteemed Iantha woman will be buried in the Iantha cemetery following funeral services in the Iantha Wethodist church.
