Vesta "Betty Jo" Vaughnita Ferguson Winchell, 72, died at 2:45 P.M. Wednesday, June 9, 1999, at her residence, east of Milford, Mo., after a sudden illness.

Betty Jo was born October 25, 1926, at Warsaw, Mo., to Grover Cleveland and Maude (Erin) Ferguson. She had lived most of her life in Barton County. Betty Jo was a homemaker and a writer of the Horse Creek Nickers and had published one book "The 4 R's of Barton County" and had almost completed a second book "The Yates Family". Her many interests included being a member of the Barton County Womens Democratic Club, she was the Barton County Democratic committeewoman of Milford Township, was on the Howell Cemetery Board, and a member of the Horsecreek Homemaker's Club.

Betty Jo was a member of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints in Lamar.

She married F. Merle Winchell on October 31, 1943, at Urbana, Mo. He survives of the home.
